The patriotic spirit of a local family provided a memorable occasion for about 100 guests Saturday night. The James Grant family entertained at a Bicentennial Costume Ball in the recently remodeled third floor ballroom of their home,

Everyone dressed in colorful colonial costumes for the Bicentennial Birthday party. Mrs. Grant wore a light blue gown made from a pattern of prize winning 1775 Paris fashion, found with old papers when the Grants bought their home from Robert and Stanley Greenwood about 11 years ago.

For the festive occasion, elaborate silver punch bowls with little badgers among the carvings on the legs; a centerpiece filled with red, white and blue carnations; and graceful silver candelabra first used on the U.S.S. Wisconsin in 1901 was loaned by the State Historical Society through the efforts of Mrs. Mary Wilson, historian for the L.D. Fargo Library.

The Revolutionary days atmosphere was enhanced by Lloyd Cohen as the Town Crier, who kept things moving along; by Andrew, Angela, Geoffrey and Beth Grant in a "Spirit of '76 skit; by Judy and Beth Grant in a patriotic, Uncle Sam tap-dancing routine, and by Ken Grant and his Bicentennial String Quartet chamber music.

The Tudor-Gothic style house was built in 1902 by Arthur G. Greenwood of the banking family. Mrs. Connor T. Hansen, a descendant of the architect, George Ferry, was among the guests. Ferry also designed the Lorenzo Dow Fargo Library and the State Historical Society Building, Madison.
